Del Gandio, Papadakis Receive Lederer Award

ISASI President Frank Del Gandio and ISASI Fellow and safety advocate Myron Papadakis received the 2013 ISASI Jerome F. Lederer Award at the society's recent annual seminar on air accident investigation held in Vancouver B.C., Canada. The award is presented in recognition of a single event, a series of events, or lifetime contributions to technical excellence in furthering aviation accident investigation and achieving ISASI objectives.

The selection of Myron P. "Pappy" Papadakis, J.D. centered on a life-long endeavor reflecting a dedication to improving quality assurance and systematically addressing aviation hazards to thereby reduce crashes. In addition to serving as ISASI President for 13 years, Frank Del Gandio's aviation career of more than 44 years has been a lifetime of improving aviation safety through mentoring entry level and journeyman aviation safety personnel, improving aircraft accident investigation techniques, and promoting quality aviation safety recommendations on a national and international basis. ISASI Gains ICAO Observer Status

ISASI obtained official "Observer Status" at the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO), ISASI President Frank Del Gandio announced to the international council meeting in August. On May 29, 2013 the ICAO Council, in session, and while dealing with ICAO relations with the United Nations, the specialized agencies and other international organizations, "...agreed that the International Society of Air Safety

Investigators (ISASI)... should be included in the *List of international organizations that* may be invited to attend suitable ICAO meetings as observers"

In his September request for status Frank said, "I believe that by granting observer status to ISASI, all aspects of aviation will be improved. A closer and constant relationship is in the best interest of both organizations and their respective membership." The European Society won the bid to host ISASI 2015 at Augsburg, Bavaria, located in southern Germany tentatively on Aug. 24-27, 2015. ISASI 2014 will carry the theme: *ISASI and Safety Management Systems*; the 2015 theme has not yet been adopted. ISASI Accepts MENASASI Affiliation Petition

The Middle East North Africa Society of Air Safety Investigators' petition to affiliate with the international body, ISASI, was accepted and signed by ISASI President Frank Del Gandio at the society's annual seminar, ISASI 2013 held in Vancouver B.C. Canada in August. At the May inaugural workshop of the Middle East and North Africa Society of Air Safety Investigators Fazal Ali Baksh, senior air accident investigator, General Civil Aviation Authority of United Arab Emirates (GCAA) said in his introductory remarks. "Safety Investigators worldwide have established local Societies, however no such initiative was recorded in this region. That is why the GCAA AAIS initiated the effort to bring safety investigators closer together, so they could benefit from each other experience." In the workshop's welcoming address, Ismaeil Abdul Wahed, executive director of the Air Accident Investigation Sector, GCAA, noted, "...that in establishing MENASASI he was conscious of the need to lay strong foundations so that MENASASI will grow well in the years ahead." ISASI Treasurer Reports 2013 Positive; Sets 2014 Budget

Robert (Bob) MacIntosh, ISASI treasurer, reported to the society's international council in August that "...the 2013 year end expenses can be expected to remain in the black," and that with the proceeds from ISASI 2014 "...there is ample opportunity to complete 2014 with positive cash flow." For the 2014 fiscal year, Bob foresees expense increases in several areas that include enhancement of ISASI's member communications efforts, increases in supplying international member services, increases in business insurance and bank fees and council travel expenses. Accommodating those costs, he proposed a 2014 budget of \$215,041, which the Council approved. As a closing item, Bob noted that the society's net assets/fund balance in 2012 was \$328,516. UAS Working Group Nears Final Guideline Document

ISASI'S Unmanned Aircraft Systems Working Group, chaired by Tom Farrier is set to begin reviewing a first draft of a new ISASI *Investigators' Guidelines* document specific to UAS (otherwise referred to in some ICAO circles as "Remotely Piloted Aircraft Systems"). This document will address the following tasks listed in Working Group's Terms of Reference:

- 1. Determine properties of unmanned aircraft systems and their operations that differ from existing aircraft.
- 2. Identify additional investigative capabilities that may need to be developed or made more robust to support the investigation of UAS-involved accidents.
- 3. For Annex 13 to the Convention on International Civil Aviation, Aircraft Accident and Incident Investigation, determine the extent to which Annex 13 definitions for

the States of Design, Manufacture, Occurrence, Registry and the Operator can be applied to unmanned aircraft systems, including their ground- and satellite-based components.

- 4. Assess the adequacy of current guidance regarding determination of the State responsible for conducting the investigation of a UAS accident.
- 5. Document any need to recommend changes to Annex 13 related to the above.
- 6. Identify a standard dataset that should be captured for each UAS-involved accident.
- 7. Identify additional UAS-specific training requirements for air safety investigators based on the above.
- 8. Identify additional regulations that may be needed to create or preserve evidence relevant to UAS accidents.

ISASI Mentoring Program Moves Forward

In January 2012, President Frank Del Gandio announced the initiation of a student mentoring program, noting that it was "...a natural outgrowth of our highly successful memorial scholarship program." Anthony Brickhouse, ISASI member and Embry- Riddle Aeronautical University professor, accepted the invitation to develop and lead the program.

Anthony now reports that the program has progressed well, with 27 ISASI members volunteering as mentors and 23 students participating in the program. He expects the program to grow in the next month since universities/colleges are starting their fall semesters.

The number of students seeking mentors could soon exceed the number of mentors available. So, a concerted effort is being made to recruit ISASI members for the program. President Del Gandio says of the program, "We have a chance to make a difference and are limited only by our imagination."
